2022 STATE OF THE SECTOR REPORT

WHY DO WE DO THIS?

BCF aims to help donors, nonprofit professionals, board members, volunteers, and the general public better understand the opportunities and challenges in our community and inspire them to take action in a meaningful way. The State of the Sector report, which takes a deeper dive into data based on findings of its annual nonprofit survey, is designed to be visually appealing and easy to understand. BCF distributes it for free to community members.

Based on the findings from BCF's 2022 Nonprofit Survey, last year's State of the Sector report identified two top priority areas for our community as it recovers from the pandemic—mental health and affordability. Below is a summary of the 2022 State of the Sector Report: A View of Our Community.

AFFORDABILITY

- Housing prices increased 150% locally since 2014, compared to 85% nationally
- Community members making a household income of less than \$78,752 are at a disadvantage in our community
- Earnings growth overall improved in 2022, but after accounting for inflation, the gains disappear
- More vulnerable groups are single women with children, seniors, and youth

MENTAL HEALTH

- Mental health nationwide declined during the pandemic, with 41% of adults reporting an anxiety or depressive disorder in 2021 compared to only 11% in 2019
- Females suffered from anxiety at a significantly higher rate than males during the pandemic
- Pandemics tend to negatively impact the mental health of those living in lower socioeconomic groups, and those with lower salaries are significantly more likely to lose their job
- Bainbridge Island School District (BISD) students experienced increased anxiety and depression between 2019 and 2021
- BISD students have less depression but more anxiety compared to students across the state

NONPROFITS

- 100% of local nonprofits that answered the survey make their programs and services accessible to lowincome families
- While some nonprofits directly provide mental health counseling, others provide an outlet to help support mental health such as outdoor or cultural activities
- 48% of nonprofits reported stronger operations than before COVID, often attributed to the cohesiveness of employees, the ability to remain flexible, and the essential need for nonprofit work in the community
- 33% of nonprofits felt they were not as strong as they were before COVID
- 78% of local nonprofit staff make less than \$64,190 full-time salary, which was the Kitsap County Area Median Income for one person before 2020 Census results were released
- Almost 50% of nonprofits cannot offer their staff health insurance, and almost 60% reported that their salary and benefits package is not sufficient enough to hire and retain qualified employees



GRANTMAKING OVERVIEW

WHY DO WE DO THIS?

BCF's competitive grantmaking program was created as a way to build a permanent and reliable resource for funding for local nonprofits, so that our community could continue to thrive and access a high quality of life. Our grantmaking provides nonprofits with an ability to fund essential programs and needs as well as makes financial support available during emergency situations.

BCF's grantmaking program responds to nonprofit needs. In 2022, a record **725 grants** of all types totaling **more than** \$2.9 million were awarded to nonprofits. This amount includes 515 Donor Advised Fund (DAF) grants totaling more than \$2.3 million supporting the causes and organizations that fund advisors value. DAF grants make up the majority of BCF's grantmaking, including its Community Grants Cycle and its Capacity Building Grants Cycle.

Other grants included 16 scholarships for a total of \$36,500, 26 Area of Interest Fund grants totaling more than \$200,000, as well as grants from BCF Discretionary Funds, Designated Funds, and Nonprofit Agency Funds.

BCF's Community Grants Cycle (CGC) is the intersection where community needs meet nonprofit work. The CGC is an opportunity for BCF to fund needs as they emerge for nonprofits, as well as use its annual nonprofit survey to inform funding opportunities.

In 2022, 50 volunteers reviewed and vetted 61 applications to the CGC, 60 of those were approved and

funded. BCF provided \$50,000 in initial funding, and the rest of the support came from generous donors who gave at all levels for a record-setting amount of \$561,692 in grants to local nonprofits.



CAPACITY BUILDING GRANTS CYCLE

WHY DO WE DO THIS?

BCF is one of the few community foundations in Washington State that awards capacity building grants for local nonprofits. BCF's unique Capacity Building Grants Cycle provides resources for local nonprofits to grow their expertise in a particular area of their choice. Most nonprofits apply to this grant cycle to help pay for training or expert advice where needed—some focused on DEI workshops while others look to hire a multi-year strategic planning consultant.


In 2022, BCF received 23 applications, of which 19 were approved. Eight of the requests came from new applicants, seven of which were approved. This was the largest number of new applicants to this grants program since it began, enabling BCF to assist an even greater number of nonprofits. Of those grants that were not approved for funding, it was recommended that the requests were better suited for the Community Grants Cycle.


In total, BCF funded a record \$27,450, up from \$23,250 in 2021. BCF provided \$7,000 in initial funding, and the remaining funds were contributed by generous fund advisors of Donor Advised Funds. BCF has granted a total of \$135,180 to 47 different local **nonprofit organizations** through this program.

AREA OF INTEREST FUNDS

WHY DO WE DO THIS?

Area of Interest Funds are a way for donors to ensure specific causes are supported in our community, such as affordable housing or extracurricular activities for youth. They complement BCF's competitive grants programs to ensure we never miss an opportunity to focus on particular areas of need.

A few of BCF's Area of Interest Funds are highlighted below.

HOUSING ACTION FUND

The Housing Action Fund was established by BCF in 2009, and makes seed money available to nonprofits for supporting affordable housing initiatives. In 2022, BCF awarded a \$100,000



grant to support affordable housing options Action Fund at Bethany Lutheran Church.

IDEAS FUND

BCF created the Inclusion, Diversity, Equity, Accessibility, and Social Justice (IDEAS) framework for promoting and supporting equal access to opportunities, programs, resources, and services for all.



In 2022, BCF worked in partnership with local nonprofits to assess ways to improve IDEAS work in our community. BCF also recognized five nonprofits in its Community Grants Cycle with the IDEAS Award. While 32 of the 61 applications identified their applications as related to IDEAS work, the five nonprofits that received the award were at different stages in their IDEAS journey. These organizations were Bainbridge Artisan Resource Network (BARN), Kitsap Immigrant Assistance Center (KIAC), Peacock Family Services, Vitalize Kitsap, and WEAVE Presents. Their applications included supporting affordable access to childcare for low-income families, expanding access to programs for neurodiverse adults and teens, and creating awareness of social and cultural diversity through the arts. Each nonprofit received \$2,000 as part of their grant award for their IDEAS efforts, with a

total distribution of \$10,000 in BCF IDEAS awards.

YOUTH EXPERIENCE SUPPORT (YES) FUND

The YES Fund provides financial assistance to young people who may not have the resources to meet basic needs, achieve academic success, or pursue extracurricular activities. BCF's partnership with Bainbridge Schools Foundation, Bainbridge Youth Services, Helpline House and Bainbridge



Youth

Island School District supports youth access to sports equipment, music lessons, dance lessons, registration fees, or similar needs.

It has been viewed as such a successful program that Fishline Food Bank & Comprehensive Services has created a similar initiative modeled after the YES Fund called **Student Opportunities & Advancement Resources (SOAR)** to provide financial assistance for students (K-12) who reside in Poulsbo, Keyport, Suquamish, and Bangor.

During the 2021-2022 funding cycle, BCF awarded \$33,690 from the YES Fund, providing students access to these positive life experiences. Requests averaged around \$200.

Some other BCF Area of Interest Funds include:

- Community Response Fund: This fund provides financial resources to nonprofit organizations for urgent health and human service needs in our community, especially during times of economic hardship or human or natural disaster.
- Capacity Building Grants Cycle Partners: This special grant program helps nonprofits become more effective by building their capacity to function as stronger, more efficient organizations.
- **Dance Performance Fund:** Benefiting the entire community, this fund supports all genres of dance performances from ballet, tap, modern, contemporary, and hip hop to expose community members to the art of dance.

SCHOLARSHIPS

WHY DO WE DO THIS?

Scholarships are an opportunity to provide continued investment in young people as they pursue higher education. These scholarships recognize both hard work and good character.

Every year, BCF awards scholarships to high school seniors in the Bainbridge community to further their education. These promising young members of our community have used this money to pursue dreams in science, music, sports, arts, or education.

In 2022, BCF awarded a total of \$36,500 to 16 students. To date, BCF has distributed \$325,500 for 122 scholarships to benefit graduating students since the beginning of the program.



LOCAL SUPPORT, GLOBAL IMPACT

A Donor Advised Fund gives the fund advisor flexibility and an ability to act fast on a funding opportunities—some which might be under extraordinary circumstances. While many fund advisors donate to local causes, there are also opportunities to make a regional or global impact.

SUPPORTING FAMILIES IN UKRAINE

In early March 2022, Bainbridge Community Foundation alerted its fund advisors that they could use their funds to purchase and help distribute essential materials for Ukrainian families fleeing the Russian invasion through a locally-based nonprofit. In 3 days, 33 fund advisors had partnered to provide \$122,500 towards the effort, which is the greatest support the foundation has seen for this type of cause.

CARING FOR WILDLIFE IN PERU

In November 2022, a graduate from Bainbridge High School was in town to support the launch of an Amazon Prime documentary Wildcat, which highlighted the early stages of her nonprofit Hoja Nueva in Peru. Samantha Zwicker has already saved the lives of over 250 wild animals in the Amazon and has employed almost a dozen local and international experts to help care for them through her nonprofit. Several fund advisors attended events in support of this cause.

AREA OF INTEREST FUND HIGHLIGHT

The Kenmour M. & Marjorie Spencer Wild Animal Fund, an endowed Area-of-Interest Fund, was established with an estate gift from the Spencers. Longtime Skagit Valley residents, the Spencers had a love of the natural world around them and a commitment to supporting wild animals. In developing the Kenmour M. & Marjorie Spencer Wild Animal Fund, BCF worked with members of the Spencer family to craft a multi-point grantmaking strategy that would impact wild animals locally and internationally. The strategy focused on three primary areas: Wild Animal Rehabilitation and Care, Wild Animal Conservation, and Conservation Advocacy. In all, more than \$40,000 were granted to 13 different organizations across those areas in 2022, with a plan to more than double those awards in the successive four years.



2021 COMMUNITY GRANTS CYCLE FINAL REPORT HIGHLIGHT

Boys & Girls Club of Bainbridge Island: Youth and Academic Support (\$10,000)

Emerging from the pandemic, the Boys & Girls Club saw an increase in social anxiety and decrease in youth ability to regulate emotions. They held Community Circles twice a week for youth to share experiences, and found that kids were better able to avoid conflict by articulating how they felt when emotions escalated. Boys & Girls Club is also working to promote DEI through their programming, offering a Rainbow Club to connect youth identifying as LGBTQ+ with resources, opportunities, and each other. They invited youth to share their family traditions and cultures with the Club community. For example, one of their Muslim members prepared a presentation on how she and her family practice their faith, and another volunteer explained why he celebrated Purim as a member of the Jewish

community. Boys & Girls Club has found talking about different beliefs and practices leads to deeper conversations over

time, which ultimately promotes acceptance and

understanding. BCF's grant supported their ability to provide services to 176 youth between the ages of 5 and 18.

BCF PROGRAMS

WHY DO WE DO THIS?

BCF hosts programs for nonprofits, for donors and volunteers, and for the broader public. The programs are held in response to a need in the community identified through BCF's Annual Nonprofit Survey, through conversations with community leaders, or through requests from partners. Other programming is held to celebrate the contributions of our neighbors making a difference in the community, or to connect like-minded individuals.

PUBLIC PROGRAMMING

Financial Education Series

Financial literacy is empowering—yet good, practical education about financial management is too often out of reach for people, especially those with limited incomes. On behalf of BCF, former board member Paul Merriman organized five free virtual events with speakers who are nationally renowned experts in their fields in order to help educate our community on how to better plan for our futures. These events targeted all ages and levels of financial literacy, including youth, first-time investors who are still in the workforce, and those who have just entered retirement. All five events were recorded and are available on BCF's website.

NONPROFIT EDUCATION

Training for Nonprofits

In February 2022, BCF's Annual Nonprofit Survey revealed the top four training priorities were marketing/communications, advanced fundraising, board development, and Diversity,

Equity, and Inclusion (DEI). In response to these results, and after conversations with nonprofit professionals, BCF responded by hosting trainings on these topics. In 2022, BCF:

- Hired experts to present on marketing/communications tools and the intersection of marketing and fundraising.
 BCF asked presenters to ensure DEI was integrated into the training program.
- ➤ Worked closely with local volunteers on developing a training on board governance, which took place in January 2023.
- Organized three sessions with a facilitator, focused on giving nonprofit executives a chance to momentarily step out of their leadership roles and talk about how to work together to serve our community.
- ➤ Agreed to continue convening the group "DEI4BI," which is a peer learning group focused on discussing the opportunities and challenges working on DEI in our community.

LeadHERship

BCF hosts a variety of other events throughout the year for donors and volunteers, sometimes to celebrate their contributions to the community and other times to raise awareness of local issues. On March 17, 2022 BCF hosted a LeadHERship event, which was created to celebrate women philanthropists. The panel focused on the challenging topic of youth homelessness in our community. Speakers included:

- **TRUDI INSLEE**, First Spouse of the State of Washington
- KIRSTEN JEWELL, Housing and Homelessness Division Manager at Kitsap County Department of Human Services
- **SARAH FROST**, Social Worker for the Bainbridge Island School District
- **JULIA**, a Bainbridge Island High School senior facing homelessness

The panel provided a vast spectrum of the issues facing our community, from the personal point of view of an individual facing homelessness to programs and services provided at the state and local level to provide support to young people

without homes. BCF's YES Fund was discussed at length, and due to this event, Fishline

Food Bank & Comprehensive Services ended up creating a similar initiative in 2022 called Student Opportunities & Advancement Resources (SOAR) to provide financial assistance for students (K-12) who reside in Poulsbo, Keyport, Suquamish, and Bangor.

HONOREES

AKUYEA KAREN VARGAS | PHILANTHROPIC SPARK AWARD

BCF's inaugural Philanthropic Spark Award has been created to recognize persons whose actions have inspired others to both give to and serve important community causes. Akuyea Karen Vargas' influence on Kitsap County spans 30 years. After moving to

Bainbridge Island in 1992 with her husband and three children, she became involved with the school after her kids were discriminated against for the color of their skin. As she advocated for their social, emotional, and cultural needs, over time her dedication to the cause grew and expanded to the entire community. She has been able to mobilize diverse groups and individuals in Kitsap County through a variety of initiatives and nonprofits including founding The Living Arts Cultural Heritage Project (LACH) and Living Life Leadership at the Marvin Williams Community Center.

preferred anonymity to the spotlight.
But that didn't stop her from being
a dedicated community builder and
counselor to numerous local nonprofits.

What many would have considered an "angel donor," Susan was often early to support nonprofit initiatives—providing seed funding to enable new programs to be built. Susan passed away in 2022, but not before leaving a permanent mark on her community.



INVESTMENT CORNER


BCF concentrates its investment portfolio towards socially conscious, values-driven investing. Approximately 90% of BCF assets are steered toward companies and sectors demonstrating strong environmental and socially responsible characteristics – an evolving strategy often referred to as "Impact Investing" or Environmental, Social, and Governance (ESG) investing. The remaining 10% of assets are in cash and other non-impact strategies.

In 2022, BCF managed more than \$22.5 million in assets, investing donations for long-term growth and returning funds to the Bainbridge community through an array of grants and programs. The Foundation also manages various Donor Advised Funds as vehicles for private charitable giving.

BALANCED RISK ALLOCATION




BALANCED IMPACT ALLOCATION




A portfolio invested using impact strategies might, for instance, be directed toward renewable energy, environmental, housing, or other nonprofit or service industries that provide positive social & environmental, not just financial, returns. BCF is further gaining value from these investments by ensuring that 75% of the portfolio is invested in predominantly passive, low-cost stocks and bonds that are highly liquid.

During 2022, BCF assets have outperformed broad market benchmarks that represent a similar equity and fixed income exposure net of all fees by +0.9% and +0.2% for the balanced and growth asset pools respectively.

PAWS of Bainbridge Island | North Kitsap (PAWSBINK): Low-income Vet Assistance and Spay/Neuter Program (\$5,000)

The goals of this program are to increase access to low-cost spay/neuter surgeries, which decreases the overpopulation of unwanted animals especially for low-income families. PAWSBINK have found that the ripple effect of the pandemic and quarantine was staggering to animal welfare, with a huge uptick in inquiries for PAWSBINK to take surrendered pets. They have found that the financial impact of the crisis is having the largest impact—families are downsizing from houses to apartments and can't take their animals, or they can no longer afford multiple

pets. PAWSBINK's programs aim to support both the families and animals facing these challenges.

Assets Under Management Compared to Cumulative Grantmaking, 2001-2022 (unaudited)


