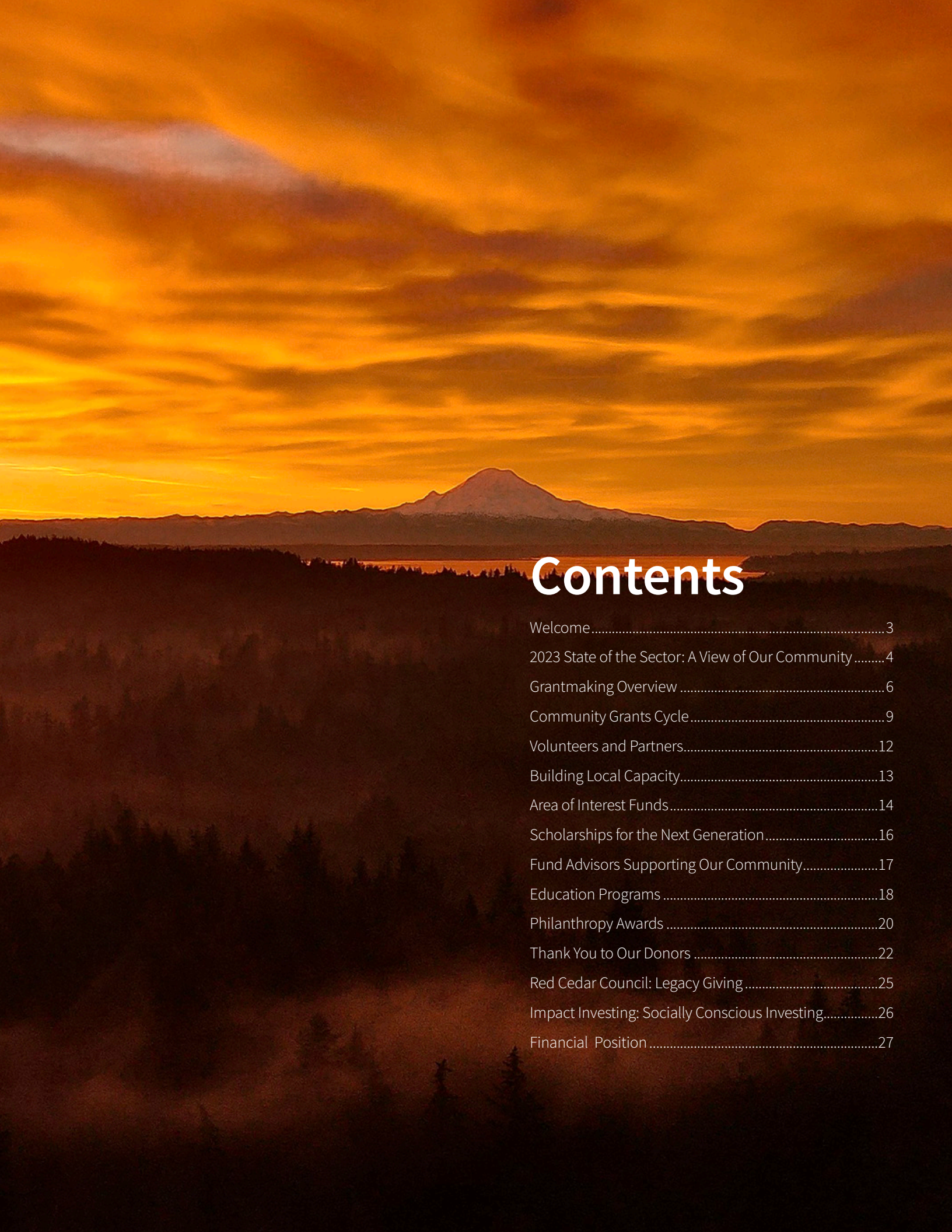

BCF's 2023 Community Report

In 2023, BCF's Community Report focused on a framework outlining ten key areas that create a sustainable and supportive community. Highlights from the report are below.

Community Framework

- **Affordability, Health Services, and Transportation** appeared to present the greatest challenges—meaning they were rated as extremely important by nonprofits but are not performing well in our community.
- **Access to Justice** has had a significant increase in demand the past several years, **Economic Opportunity** has been drastically impacted by lack of affordability and unreliable transportation, and **Civic Participation** is strong when it comes to volunteering and voting but the vast majority of Island residents do not engage with local officials once elected.
- **Respect and Social Inclusion** was rated as extremely important by nonprofits, but received significantly lower ratings than national averages by Island residents when asked about the ability to attract people from diverse backgrounds.
- **Connection to Culture, Connection to Place, and Education and Learning Opportunities** were all rated exceptionally well across the board, and if they continue to perform well, could have a positive impact on other areas such as mental and physical health.
- **There is one or more local nonprofit organizations supporting all ten of these areas for a sustainable and supportive community.**



Health of Nonprofits

Fundraising was highlighted as the biggest priority area for nonprofits in 2023, due to (1) a number of capital campaigns that were postponed due to the pandemic and (2) nonprofits needing to change their fundraising strategies post-pandemic.

57%

of nonprofits **do not have enough volunteers.**

More than **78%** of nonprofits responded they do not pay their staff more than **\$65,870 per year**, which was the Kitsap County Area Median Income at the time the 2023 Nonprofit Survey was drafted.



Almost **40%** of nonprofit staff do not pay insurance to any of their employees.



51% of nonprofits reported that their salary and benefits package is not sufficient to hire and retain qualified employees.



The combination of affordability concerns on the Island and the challenges around having competitive salaries and benefits package puts both the nonprofit community as well as other local employees at risk.



Grantmaking Overview

BCF's grantmaking program responds to nonprofit needs. In 2023, a record **756 grants** of all types totaling more than **\$2.9 million** were awarded to nonprofits.

BCF's grand total for grantmaking since inception was **nearly \$25 million** by the end of 2023.

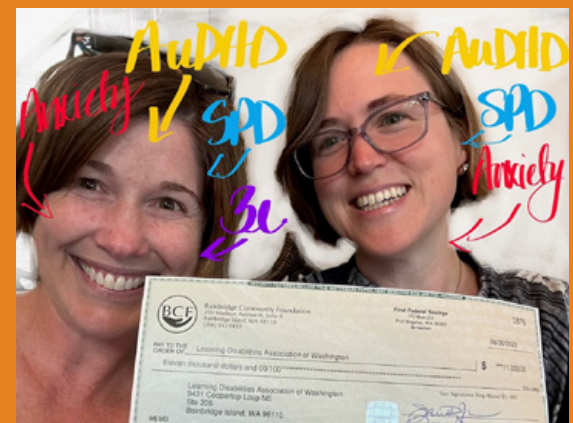
Spotlight Grantee

On a Friday night, two moms got together to do some pottery and talk about life and children. Soon, the group grew to three, and then four. Three of the moms worked with neurodivergent children professionally. All four were neurodivergent themselves and raising neurodivergent kids—there were a lot of connections and shared experiences. Two months later, they created Neurodiverse Connections—a local nonprofit that envisions a world where every neurodivergent child grows up knowing that he, she, or they has value, exactly as they are, without needing to mask or change.

Bainbridge Community Foundation awarded a grant to Neurodiverse Connections for the first time in 2023—with an additional award from the Inclusion, Diversity, Equity, Accessibility, and Social Justice (IDEAS) Fund—to help them fund teacher and elementary student NeuroEmpathy Workshops in the fall of 2023. Workshops focused on building empathy and understanding for neurodiversity by offering educators experiences that mirror how school tasks might feel for neurodivergent students. For example, during one task, BISD educators were treated to an “auditory obstacle course” of Hamlet overlaid by common classroom noises at unpredictable volumes—mirroring how many neurodivergent students feel when sensitive to noise. Participants were encouraged to notice their own responses which included racing hearts, disconnection, and hands over ears when the mock fire alarm sounded.

One of the founders, Meg Wolf, explains “The goal of NeuroEmpathy is to provide an experience that challenges the way we are accustomed to processing the world. It’s one thing to understand ADHD or dyslexia conceptually, but when we get to spend time actively trying to navigate the differences, challenges, and frustrations that are part of neurodivergent life, we gain a much deeper understanding.”

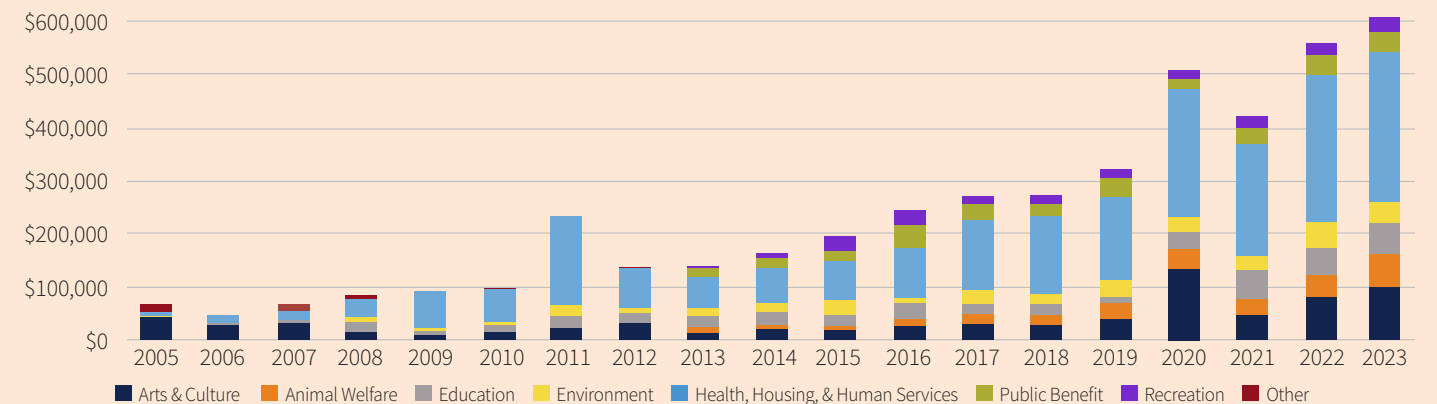

GRANTMAKING

Capacity Building Grants Cycle

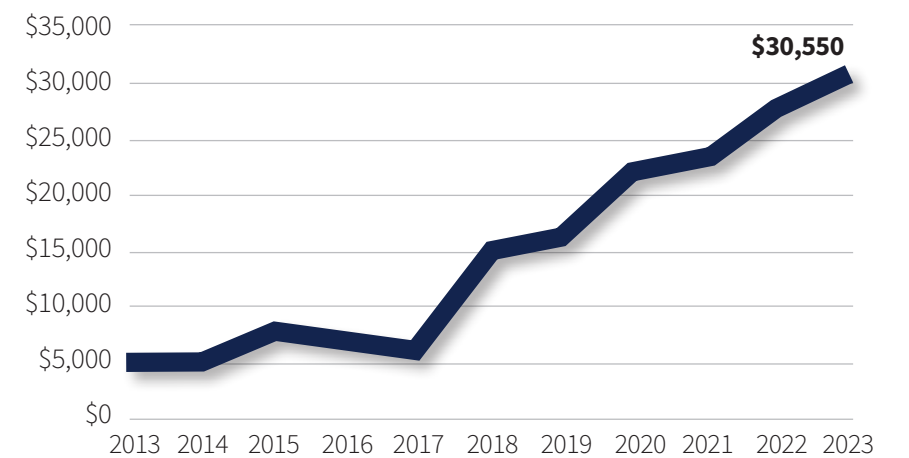
BCF is one of the few community foundations in Washington State that awards capacity building grants for local nonprofits. This unique grant cycle provides funding for nonprofits seeking to increase their knowledge, skill level, or efficiency of their staff or boards. Out of the 28 applications in 2023, **22 were approved by the BCF Grants Committee** for a record funding of \$30,550. This includes \$3,000 in \$600 grants to five organizations from BCF's IDEAS Fund.

This was the largest number of new applicants to this grants program since it began, enabling BCF to assist an even greater number of nonprofits. Of those grants that were not approved for funding, it was recommended that the requests were better suited for the Community Grants Cycle which opens only a few months later in February 2024.

In total, BCF funded a record **\$30,550**, up from \$27,450 in 2022. BCF provided \$7,000, and the remaining funds were contributed by generous fund advisors of donor advised funds. BCF has granted a total of **\$165,680 to 57 different local nonprofit organizations since 2013** through its Capacity Building Grants program.

Affordability

Area of Interest Funds

BCF's Area of Interest Fund Supports Local Youth

“It was this beautiful gift of resources focused on helping youth,” expressed Maria Metzler, Executive Director of Helpline House. “I loved being around that table.” Maria was referring to her experience participating in a focus group which was the beginning of **BCF's Youth Experience Support (YES) Fund**. A motivated donor, along with a number of local organizations, came together to discuss children who were falling through the cracks—not having enough resources to participate in extracurricular activities that make for a mentally and physically healthy child.

The YES Fund, having grown since this initial roundtable in 2018, provides financial assistance to young people who may not have the resources to meet basic needs, achieve academic success, or pursue extracurricular activities. BCF's partnership with Bainbridge Schools Foundation, Bainbridge Youth Services, Helpline House and Bainbridge Island School District supports youth access to sports equipment, music lessons, dance lessons, registration fees, or similar needs.

During the 2022-2023 funding cycle, BCF awarded \$26,069 from the YES Fund, providing students access to these positive life experiences. There was a total of 249 requests for funding.

Maria said about the YES Fund, “kids and parents in need know it's a yes. There is a fund available to support youth when they need it. And we won't ask questions.”

BCF's Area of Interest Funds are a way for donors to ensure specific causes are supported in our community, such as affordable

housing or extracurricular activities for youth. They complement BCF's competitive grants programs to ensure we never miss an opportunity to focus on particular areas of need. Many of the Area of Interest Funds meet the needs highlighted in the

SPOTLIGHT IDEAS Fund

BCF created the Inclusion, Diversity, Equity, Accessibility, and Social Justice (IDEAS) framework for promoting and supporting equal access to opportunities, programs, resources, and services for all. In 2023, BCF worked in partnership with local nonprofits to assess ways to improve IDEAS work in our community. BCF also recognized five nonprofits in its Community Grants Cycle with the IDEAS Award. While 41 of the 68 applications this year identified their applications as related to IDEAS work, only five organizations received the award—recognizing nonprofits at different stages in their IDEAS journey. These organizations were **Bainbridge History Museum, Housing Resources Bainbridge, Kids In Concert, Kitsap Legal Services, and Neurodiverse Connections**. Their applications included providing neurodiversity education and NeuroEmpathy workshops for local schools, health and safety home modifications for low-income adults, and preserving community access to historical and cultural stories. Each nonprofit received \$2,000 as part of their grant award for their IDEAS efforts, with a total distribution of \$10,000 in BCF IDEAS awards.

Scholarships

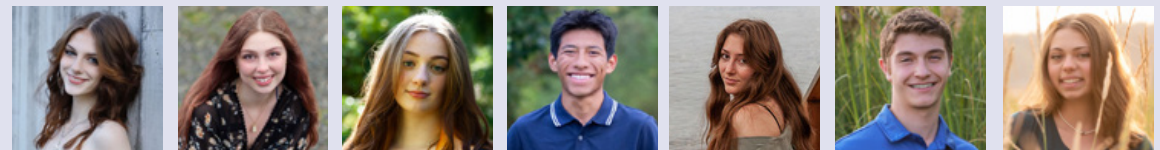
“Receiving support from the community through BCF’s scholarship really made an impact on how I felt about my ability to make a difference,” said Maxwell Bispham, a 2023 recipient of the Vincent F. Petrie Memorial Scholarship. Max moved to Bainbridge Island when he was one year old, and has had a variety of community-driven experiences as a teenager that has led him to be interested in the social impact and ethics of the tech world. From a job at the local Walgreens to volunteering with Bainbridge Youth Services, Max had a plethora of experience working with different types of people of all ages. These experiences, plus his scholarship from BCF, has motivated him to continue making social change through his interest in AI.

Every year, BCF awards scholarships to high school seniors in the Bainbridge community to further their education. Scholarships are an opportunity to provide continued investment in young people as they pursue higher education. All students, like Max, are recognized for their hard work and good character, and are promising young members of our community pursuing dreams in science, music, sports, arts, or education. In 2023, BCF awarded a total of \$49,500 to 22 students. To date, BCF has distributed \$375,000 for 144 scholarships to benefit graduating students since the beginning of the program.

BCF Fund Advisors raised more than \$50K to support victims of Maui wildfire

The devastating Maui wildfires in August 2023 displaced thousands of people, destroying or damaging more than 2,200 structures, 86% of which were residential. It was considered the most deadly wildfire in the US in over 100 years. BCF recommended support for the Maui Strong Fund at Hawai’i Community Foundation, which is structured like BCF’s Community Response Fund—aimed at supporting the community in a time of crisis. When told of the opportunity, BCF Fund Advisors raised more than \$50,000 for the Maui Strong Fund. Hawai’i Community Foundation did not collect a fee for donations to the fund, and 100% of donations went to organizations helping people on the ground.

BCF Programs

BCF hosts programs for nonprofits, for donors and volunteers, and for the broader public. The programs are held in response to a need in the community identified through BCF's Annual Nonprofit Survey, through conversations with

community leaders, and through requests from partners. Other programming is held to celebrate the contributions of our neighbors making a difference in the community, or to connect like-minded individuals.

Public Programming: Financial Literacy

Financial literacy is empowering—yet good, practical education about financial management is too often out of reach for people, especially those with limited incomes. On behalf of BCF, former board member Paul Merriman organized four free virtual events with speakers who are nationally renowned experts in their fields in order to help educate our community on how to better plan for our futures. These events targeted all ages and levels of financial literacy, including youth, first-time investors who are still in the workforce, and those who have just entered retirement. All four events were recorded and are available on BCF's website at www.BainbridgeCF.org/Programs/Public-Education-Programs.

Nonprofit Education

BCF also conducts trainings when needs are highlighted in its Annual Nonprofit Survey. BCF's 2023 Nonprofit Survey saw a sharp rise in need for fundraising training combined with a desire for better marketing and outreach. BCF has also seen consistent request to deepen and strengthen existing programming over the course of several years. BCF responded in 2023 by offering nonprofits:



- **Mini-course on Nonprofit Program Design:** After reviewing these multifaceted needs in the 2023 Nonprofit Survey, BCF Board Member David Harrison—also University of Washington Senior Lecturer Emeritus—offered a free mini-course of five classes to take a deep dive in Nonprofit Program Design. With 18 participants, nonprofits were able to discuss in depth the complexities of managing programs. Given the success of this mini-series, David Harrison is conducting more courses in 2024 including Nonprofit Management and Board Excellence.
- **Development Roundtables:** BCF is hosting monthly Development Roundtables, where nonprofit fundraising professionals can gather and discuss a variety of topics related to fundraising. Rather than an ad-hoc training, this provides a format for peer learning—and has been well-attended with 15-20 participants each time.
- **Communications/Marketing Roundtables:** BCF hosts quarterly communications/marketing roundtables, where nonprofits and others in the community—including the Chamber of Commerce and the Fire Department—can meet to discuss happenings in the community.
- **DEI4BI:** In 2023, BCF inherited the group DEI4BI from several community members who had been holding discussions around Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion. BCF hosted the group four times in 2023, where community members are encouraged to discuss anything related to DEI in the community—from events around town to any challenges their organization might be facing.

PROGRAM SPOTLIGHT LeadHERship

BCF hosted its annual LeadHERship event at Bainbridge Island Museum of Art (BIMA) in honor of International Women's Day on March 8. BCF created LeadHERship to provide a platform for female leaders to share their stories and inspire action. This year's event honored women of color in our community, where they shared stories of oppression and talked about the power of resilience and healing. When discussing the work happening here in our community, Akuyea Karen Vargas said, "This community for years has been doing the work on healing and race equity. We have to keep breaking

down these barriers, and we have to have race equity work. We can come together to celebrate each other, and we can build healthy relationships."

The reception was surrounded by BIMA's Rosa Parks exhibit, which highlighted her power, humanity, and determination, along with her broader civil rights activism. BCF was honored to host this event and we are thankful for everything the speakers do for this community.

Lilly Kodama | Philanthropic Spark Award

Lilly Kodama was born in 1934 on Bainbridge Island, and grew up on the Island before being removed with her family to the Manzanar concentration camp in California in 1942. While she left to explore opportunities beyond the Island after graduating high school in 1952, she returned to Bainbridge Island in 1998. She soon got involved with local nonprofits, and has had an immense impact on sharing personal and historical stories about Japanese exclusion with children and adults to further education on this important part of history. She has helped activate the Japanese American Exclusion Memorial’s motto *Nido to Nai Yoni* (Let it Not Happen Again) as a place of remembrance and action.

Bainbridge Island PIH Engage | Outstanding Youth Philanthropists

Functioning as a chapter of the grassroots global health organization Partners in Health (PIH), Bainbridge Island PIH

Engage (BIPIHE) fundraises, educates and advocates for PIH and wider global health issues. Last year, these dedicated Bainbridge Island students raised more funding for PIH programming than any other high school chapter, and while leaders of BIPIHE continue to graduate, they successfully pass on the torch to future student leaders—creating a sustainable global health effort run by the Island’s youth.

Quitslund Brothers and their Wives | Outstanding Bainbridge Philanthropists

The four Quitslund brothers, sons of Ford and Eve Quitslund, and their wives were awarded the Outstanding Philanthropist award for their combined impact on the community. The brothers and their wives have had a profound and broad reach on Bainbridge Island—serving on multiple local nonprofit boards, helping support nonprofits abroad, serving on Bainbridge Island City Council, and contributing to arts and

culture in the community. But most importantly, they have spread a culture of family and friendship that will last for generations.

Clark Construction | Outstanding Philanthropic Company

Clark Construction has been dedicated to giving back to the community from day one. Volunteerism is a part of the culture of the firm, with employees donating numerous hours to a wide variety of community causes. Founded by women, this employee-owned company is committed to sustainability. One of their signature community partnerships was the creation of workforce housing at the Morales Farm on Bainbridge using predominantly recycled materials, including those from other Clark projects. The project, a partnership between Coates Design, Clark Construction, Friends of the Farm, and Housing Resources Bainbridge was the first of its kind in our region and a model for innovative housing development.

DONOR SPOTLIGHT

Rebecca and Kevin Miller

“BCF pretty much sums up the personal missions in life that Rebecca and I have,” claimed Kevin Miller, who recently opened up a Donor Advised Fund (DAF) with BCF, “We want to see change in the world, and believe in unlocking people’s ability to authentically express themselves. BCF has a unique perspective on local needs to achieve this mission through its research, analysis, and grantmaking.”

Kevin first came to Bainbridge Island in 2013, and he and his wife Rebecca decided to move here from Washington, DC in 2015. Over the years, they had donated to a number of organizations, but hadn’t felt that their giving was as strategic as they

wanted. They also knew they wanted a logistically easier way to donate stock back to nonprofits they cared about.

BCF’s Donor Advised Fund allowed them to do this. Kevin continued, “not only is it easy with a DAF at BCF, but it is more meaningful. We thought about going through Fidelity, but they had zero connection to the community we were trying to impact.” Kevin and Rebecca were so enthusiastic about BCF’s work, that they voluntarily held a dinner with friends at Heyday Farm to highlight BCF’s work on the

community—and plan to do it again in 2024. To Kevin, “it’s not just a financial instrument. I can’t think of another organization that has as much of a heartbeat as BCF.”



Investment Corner

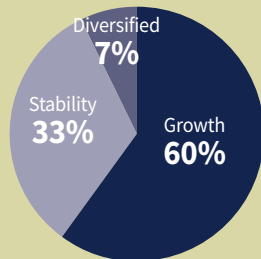
BCF concentrates its investment portfolio towards socially conscious, values-driven investing. Approximately 90% of BCF assets are steered toward companies and sectors demonstrating strong environmental and socially responsible characteristics – an evolving strategy often referred to as “Impact Investing” or Environmental, Social, and Governance (ESG) investing. The remaining 10% of assets are in cash and other non-impact strategies.

In 2023, BCF managed almost \$25 million in assets, investing donations for long-term growth and returning funds to the Bainbridge community through an array of grants and programs. The Foundation also manages various Donor Advised Funds as vehicles for private charitable giving.

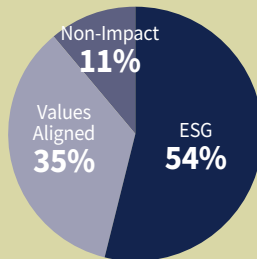
A portfolio invested using impact strategies might, for instance, be directed toward renewable energy, environmental, housing, or other nonprofit or service industries that provide positive social and environmental, not just financial, returns. BCF is further gaining value from these investments by ensuring that 75% of the portfolio is invested in predominantly passive, low-cost stocks and bonds that are highly liquid.

During 2023, BCF assets have outperformed broad market benchmarks that represent a similar equity and fixed income exposure net of all fees by +0.9% and +0.2% for the balanced and growth asset pools respectively.

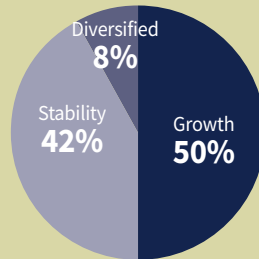
Balanced Pool Risk Allocation



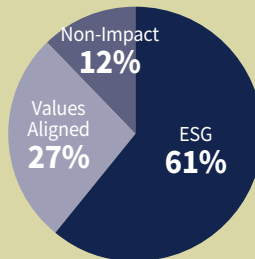
Balanced Pool Impact Allocation

Assets Under Management Compared to Cumulative Grantmaking, 2001-2023 (unaudited)

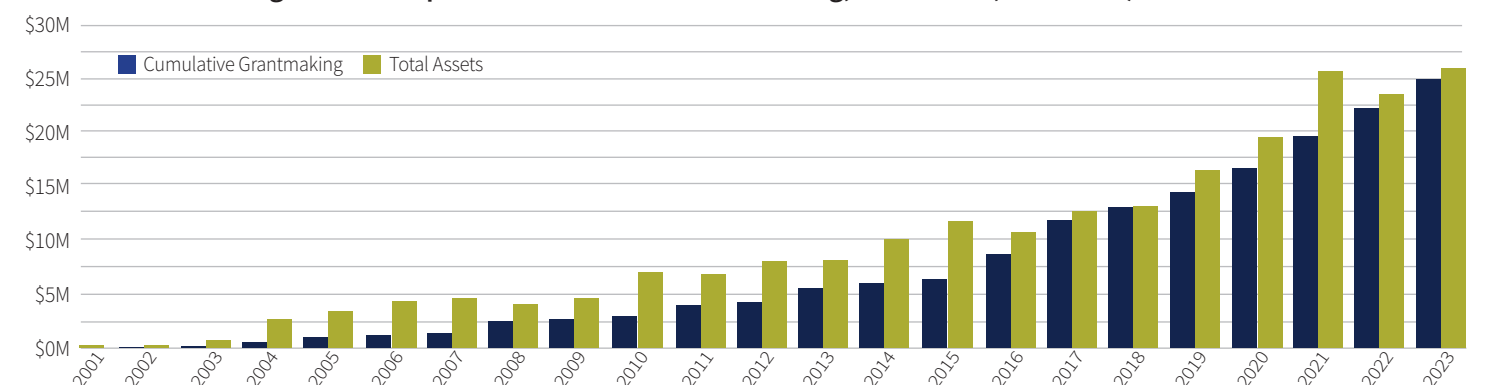
