2018 OVERVIEW

We are thrilled to report that 2018 was a fantastic year for Bainbridge Community Foundation grantmaking! A robust 369 grants were awarded, totaling \$1,234,243, including 295 Donor Advised Fund grants of \$1,011,539. In 18 years, Bainbridge Community Foundation's overall grantmaking totals more than \$13.1 million!

Through our 2018 Community Grants Cycle, 49 grants totaling a record \$273,535 were awarded to 48 nonprofits serving Bainbridge Islanders in arts and culture, animal welfare, education, environment, health and human services, and recreation. Our average grant size grew to \$5,583, an increase of more than \$1,000 over 2017's average grant amount. In total, the Community Grants Cycle has awarded \$2.11 million in local grants since its launch in 2005.

We experienced an extraordinary response to this year's Capacity Building Grants program, receiving double the average requests of prior years. Of the 12 applications approved for funding, 10 were fully funded and 2 were partially funded—a total of \$15,210 in awards ranging from \$750 to \$1,500. Since the Capacity Building Grants program began, we've distributed over \$46,000.

We were also pleased to award college scholarships, improving the lives of promising young members of our community. In 2018, we awarded 9 scholarships, totaling \$22,000. To date, we have distributed more than \$190,500 in scholarship funding.

The foundation also awarded a \$50,000 Housing Action Fund grant to support affordable housing efforts on Bainbridge Island. This area of interest fund grant will ensure permanent affordability through Housing Resources Bainbridge's Scattered Site Community Land Trust Program to ensure a community that is diverse and vital.

OVERALL GRANTMAKING HIGHLIGHTS

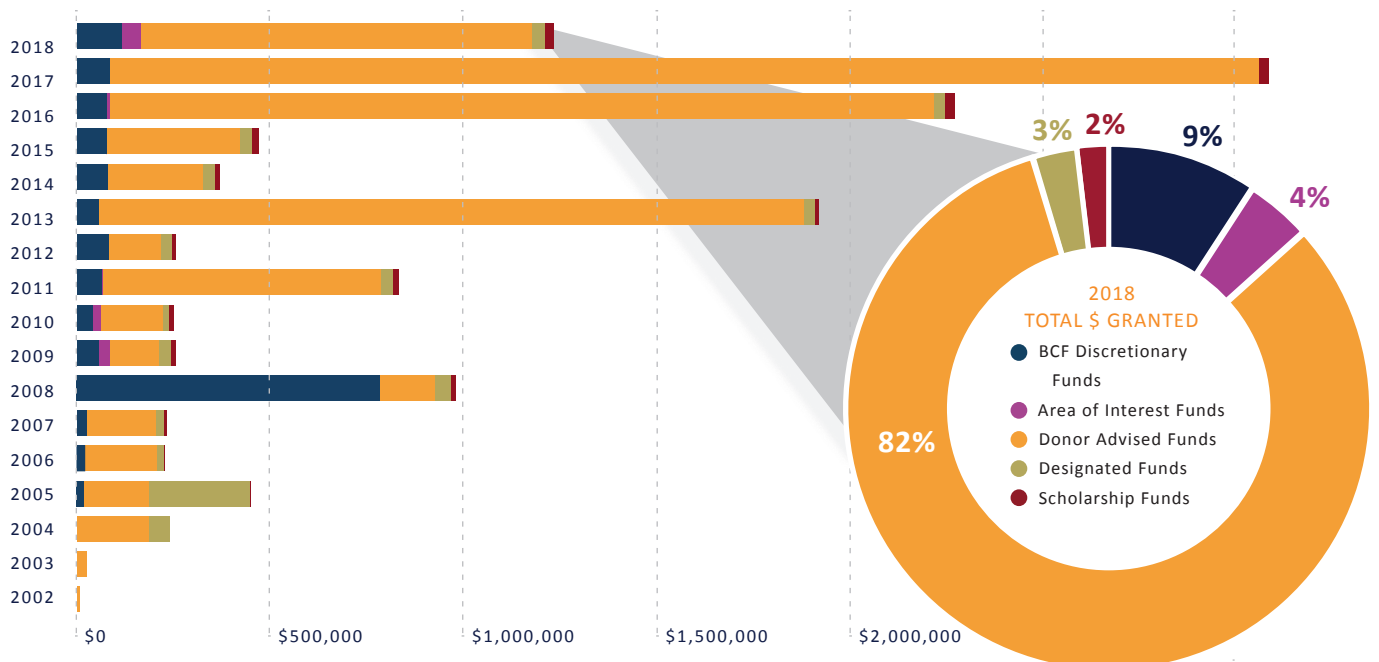
We had a very busy grantmaking year in 2018 making **369** grants totaling **\$1,234,243**.

- During this year, we had three Agency Fund grants of **\$23,481** and one Designated Fund grant of **\$11,536**. In keeping with past practice, Agency Funds and Designated Funds are added together for reporting in the graphs below.
- An amazing **295** Donor Advised Fund grants totaling **\$1,011,539** were awarded in 2018.
- One Area of Interest Fund grant was applied for and awarded in 2018. This \$50,000 grant provided seed funding for the acquisition of property for Housing Resources Bainbridge's new Scattered Site Community Land Trust Program.
- We distributed **\$22,000** to nine scholarship recipients.

TOTAL DOLLARS GRANTED BY YEAR AND FUND TYPE

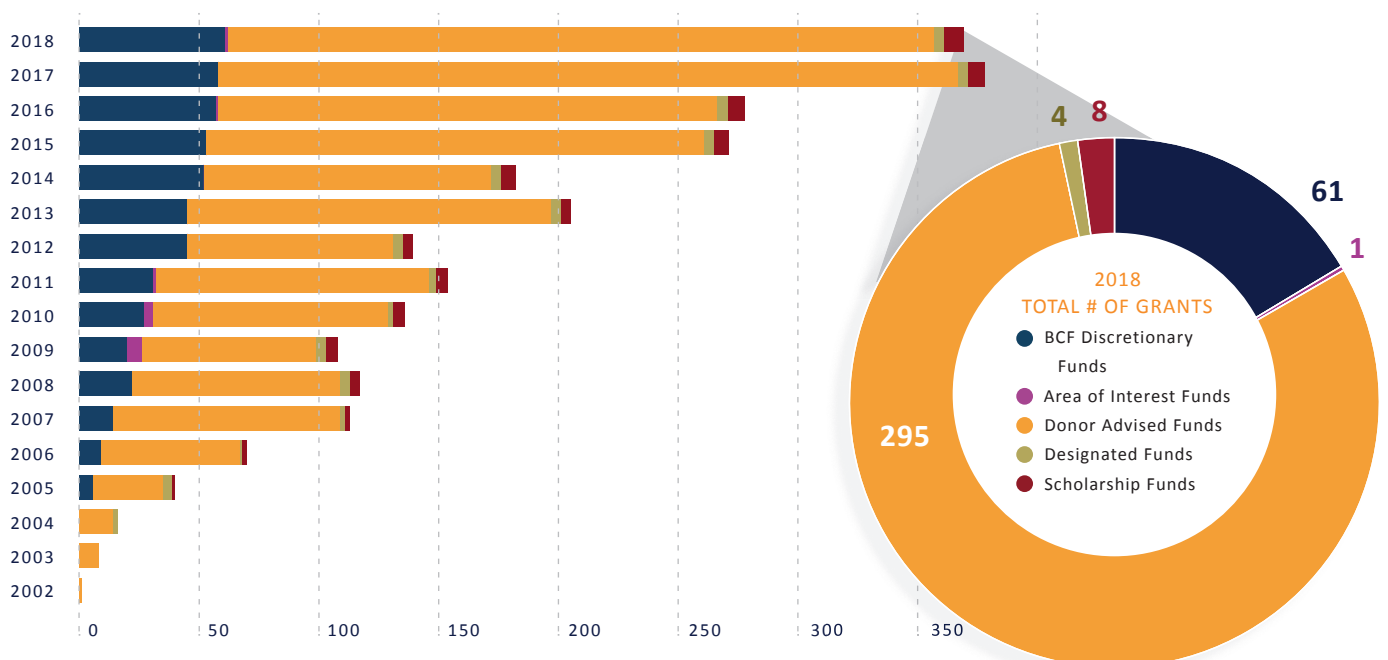

The 2018 grant recipients listed here are for all BCF grantmaking activities. Historically, 90% of our grantmaking dollars go to nonprofits serving Bainbridge Island and/or the greater Pacific Northwest.

Donor Advised Fund grants may be made to any currently registered 501(C)3 nonprofit organization operating in the United States.

Grants made through the Community Grants Cycle and Capacity Building Grants program are focused on local nonprofits serving the residents of the Bainbridge Island community.

Scholarship grants go directly to the institution of higher learning and are earmarked for the recipient.

Currently, all of our Designated Fund, Agency Fund, and Area of Interest Fund grants go to local organizations.



2018 COMMUNITY GRANT CYCLE

Bainbridge Community Foundation (BCF) has seen dramatic growth in our Community Grants Cycle, doubling our average grant size in six years. In 2018, 49 grants totaling a record \$273,535 were awarded to 48 nonprofits serving Bainbridge Islanders in arts and culture, animal welfare, education, environment, health and human services, and recreation. The 2018 Community Grants Cycle has the most dollars granted resulting in the largest average grant size, ever! More than half of this year's recipients, some 27 organizations, saw their requests fully funded and two nonprofit organizations were funded for the first time.

The success of this year's Community Grants Cycle is due in large part to the countless volunteer hours given by our evaluation team and support by our funding partners. The 2018 Community Grants Cycle engaged 67 donors, which included 22 donor advised funds—three of which were new partners to the grant cycle.

Another key to the program's growth was BainbridgeGives.org, our online grantmaking portal. The online catalog shows initial grant recommendations for each organization and invites donors to boost the awards with additional contributions. This year, the portal attracted 10 new donors. We're thrilled that this accessible, user-friendly means of reviewing meaningful giving opportunity is so effectively inspiring philanthropy.

Since its inception in 2005, the Community Grants Cycle has made \$2.11 million in local grants, providing support for specific programs, capital projects, as well as general operations of local nonprofit organizations.

Thank you to our volunteers and donors for making the 2018 Community Grants Cycle such a success!

2018 COMMUNITY GRANTS CYCLE BY THE NUMBERS

49 grants totaling a record \$273,535 were awarded to 48 nonprofits serving Bainbridge Islanders in arts and culture, animal welfare, education, environment, health and human services, and recreation.

2 local organizations were funded for the **FIRST TIME**.

The grant program engaged **67** individuals, private foundations, and donor advised funds.

27 **MORE THAN HALF** of this year's recipients, some organizations, saw their requests fully funded.

Grant applications were reviewed by an evaluation team of BCF staff and more than **40** **COMMUNITY VOLUNTEERS** who interviewed applicants, made site visits, and performed financial due diligence for each organization.

The **COLLABORATION AWARD** was given to Bainbridge Youth Services for the Healthy Youth Alliance initiative. This grant specifically funded programmatic support to host a Town Hall Meeting on youth mental and emotional health and the launch of community action teams.

The Bainbridge Island Senior Community Center received the inaugural **SHEL KLASKY AWARD** for innovative efforts to coordinate with six Bainbridge organizations to create, share, and maintain a resources and referral database for island residents. This award was established in memory of beloved BCF trustee Shel Klasky, who was a passionate member of Bainbridge Community Foundation's Grants Committee.

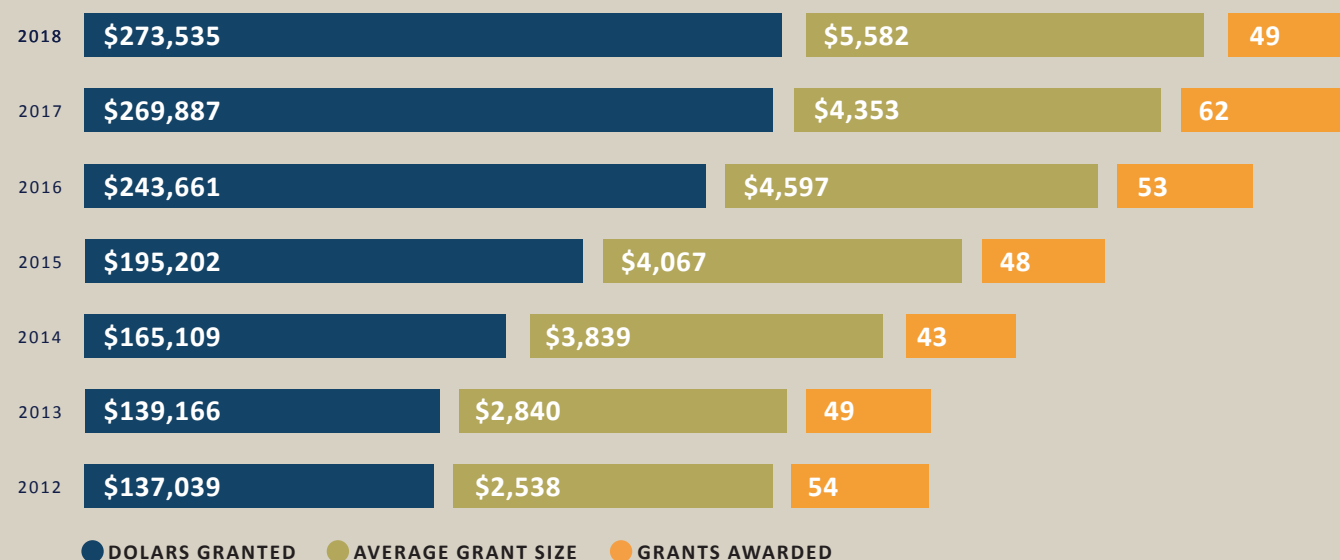
- This year's Community Grants Cycle Evaluation Team had 46 participants

PROCESS

After completing site visits in pairs and individually finishing the online evaluations, each sector team met to review and provide a recommended funding range for each application. All applications were deemed eligible to proceed. BCF staff met with individual advisors and other partners to fund the approved and vetted grant requests. BCF funded all 49 applications, allocating an initial \$49,000 of BCF discretionary/Community Grants Cycle pool monies.

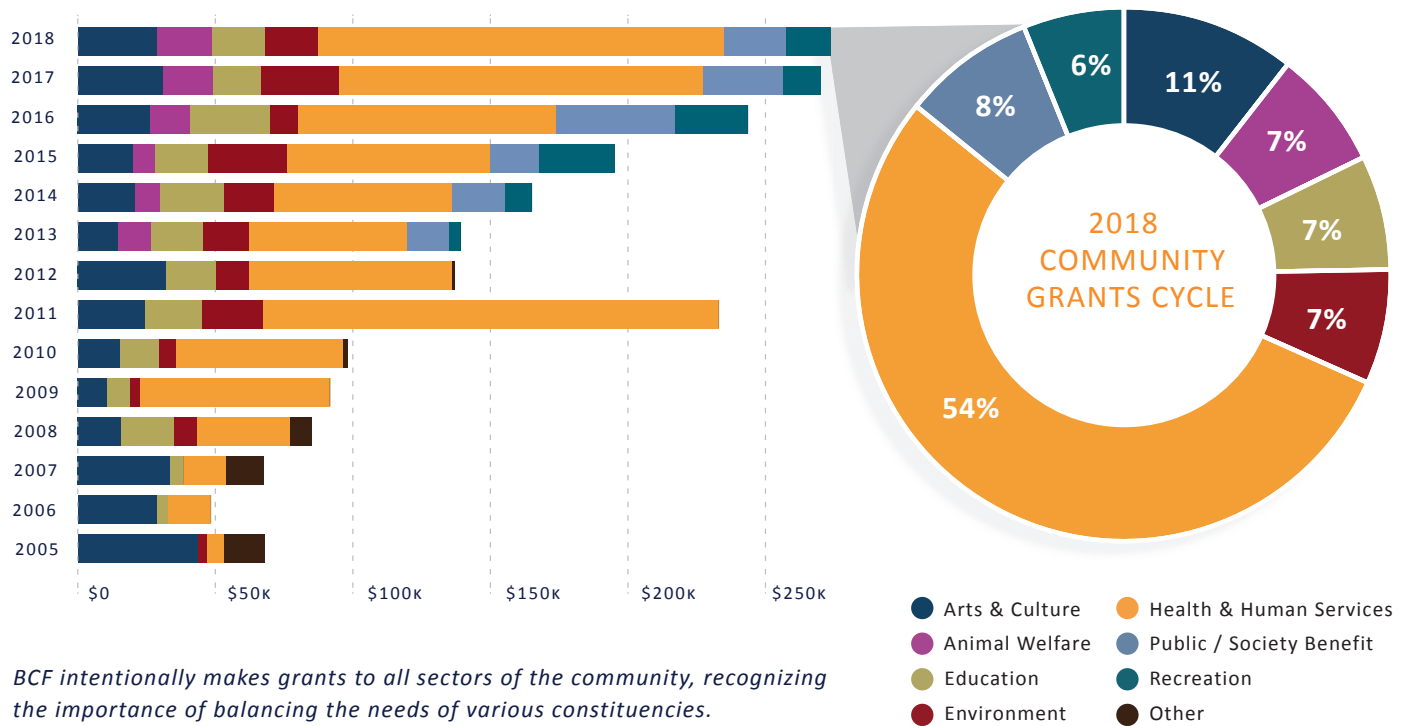

2017 Total Awarded Grants

In addition to the exciting results of the 2018 Community Grants Cycle, this autumn the foundation received Final Reports from our 2017 Community Grants Cycle grantees. These detailed summary reports provide updates on the effectiveness of that year's community grants. Some 59 of the 62 funded nonprofits completed their final reports. Of these, 57 of 59, or 97%, met or exceeded grant expectations. The three organizations that did not complete their final report will be ineligible to apply for 2019 Community Grants Cycle funding.

IMPACT OF THE 2017 COMMUNITY GRANTS CYCLE

The following accounts provide a sample of what our grantee organizations accomplished in and for the community as a result of 2017 Community Grants Cycle funding:

SCARLET ROAD

Scarlet Road received funding for its Outreach Team, which trained 1,010 students how to identify, avoid, and safely report sexual exploitation. Additionally, nine students disclosed a personal connection to someone who was a victim of exploitation—either a family member, a friend, or even themselves. One 18-year-old disclosed that she had personally experienced being sold for profit. Scarlet Road was immediately able to establish trauma-informed care for this student. The more prevention training that Scarlet Road offers, the greater the demand. Fifteen new schools and four centers for teens have requested training for the upcoming school year.

IMPACT NORTHWEST

Funding for training expenses and a community-based disaster preparedness program resulted in a Bainbridge Island community better prepared for a major disaster. Through the 12-month grant period this program had a direct, measurable impact on over 200 Bainbridge Island residents. Seventy-five residents took part in preparedness classes. Impact Northwest also reached more than 100 residents during the Bainbridge Island 3 Days of Preparedness in 2017, participating in several community and neighborhood talks reaching more than 30 residents. The organization continues to hold classes each month at the Bainbridge Island Library and will be involved heavily with this year's 3 Days of Preparedness event.

NORTH KITSAP FISHLINE

Fishline received a BCF grant to support its Homeless Support Services Program. Approximately 80% of all those seeking assistance from Fishline are in need of housing support, including eviction prevention, utility help, or assistance finding and moving into affordable housing. Fishline's HomeShare Program was extended to include property or house sharing as possible options in a community where housing prices are quickly escalating, and affordable options are scarce. The organization's emphasis on growing staff and strengthening housing programs is a reflection on this new normal and a changing set of priorities. Fishline's case manager tripled her case load, from 6 in 2017 to 18 in early 2018, a significant jump and an indication of Fishline's direction. Early 2018 numbers showed a sharp increase in eviction prevention assistance. Of clients seeking help, 100% were assisted in some way, if only with referrals or advice. Of homeless clients, 98% were provided access to shelters or other transitional housing. When shelters are full, hotel stays are available for the most vulnerable.

BAINBRIDGE ISLAND LAND TRUST

BCF funding allowed a former Conservation Crew member to work as a summer intern for the Land Trust and, with the organization's Stewardship Coordinator, supervise and support the youth conservation corps. This role supported work sessions on eight different properties: five Land Trust Conservation Easements and three Land Trust-owned

properties. The Conservation Crew worked 13 days for approximately 5 hours per day. Staff, crew members, and volunteers worked a total of 676.25 hours combined, with 9.7 acres improved across all properties. An ongoing First Wednesday Work party is key to achieving a goal of involving adult volunteers in preserving, conserving, and restoring valuable natural lands. In 2017, 63 First Wednesday volunteers contributed more than 310 hours of work. Additionally, through the All-Island Weed Pull effort, Bainbridge residents removed approximately 280 cubic yards of more than 10 different invasive species, demonstrating significant growth over the previous year.

ISLAND VOLUNTEER CAREGIVERS

Island Volunteer Caregivers received a BCF grant for its Volunteer Transportation Program, which in turn served 225 care receivers. With transportation now accounting for 65% of direct services for medical appointments, errands, social engagements, and life enrichment activities, the Volunteer Transportation Program reduces social isolation and enables residents to maintain their independence, health, and well-being and remain active in their community

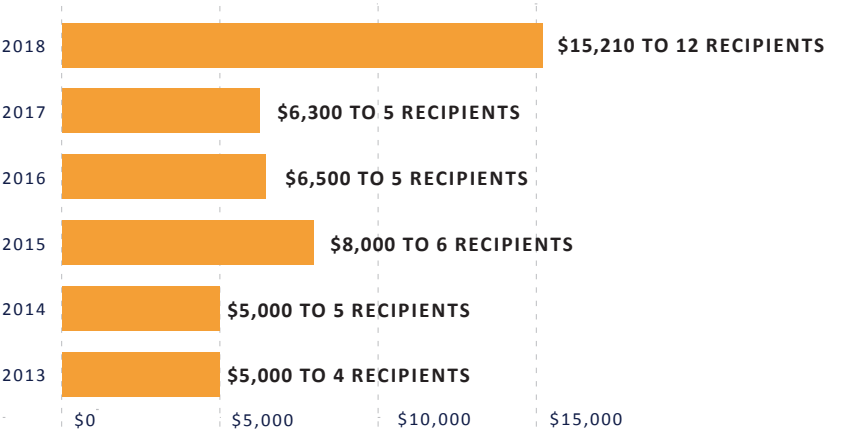
Of the 16 applications received, 12 were approved for funding, 10 were fully funded, and 2 were partially funded, for a total award of \$15,210. Funding ranged from \$750 to \$1,500.

Capacity Building Grants focus on supporting an organization’s internal capacity, funding short-term projects that must be completed within six months. These grants are intended to increase the knowledge, skill level, or efficiency of a nonprofit organization, its board members, and staff.
